Message from State Chaplain

Dear Friends,

E ach year, on October 7th, the Church celebrates the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. Many of us are quite familiar with the rosary as a part of our spiritual life; the rosary has, fittingly, a place of prominence in the life of our Church. But I suspect the origins of this particular title of our Lady are not as well known to Catholics as the prayers which make up this beautiful Marian prayer.

The origins go back to the middle of the sixteenth century, to—of all things—a naval battle off the coast of Greece, known as the Battle of Lepanto. (Many historians claim that the Battle of Lepanto is one of the most important battles in the history of western civilization.)

In the middle of the sixteenth century the Muslim forces of the Ottoman Empire (located in Turkey) were building up their military powers to carry out a plan to invade Europe and conquer the major cities of Europe and to force the solidly Christian countries of Europe to convert to the Muslim religion and to seize some of the most important churches and cathedrals of Europe and transform them into mosques. (They had their eyes fixed especially on the newly built and almost-completed Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome, which they planned to transform into the largest mosque in the world.)

Many of the European countries were greatly and rightly—alarmed at the thought of the Ottoman Empire forces conquering Europe. In an unprecedented move, Pope Pius V, sought and gained the help of many European monarchs and formed the "Holy League"—a collaborative effort that joined military forces from the Papal States, Spain, The Kingdom of Sicily, the Republic of Venice, The Republic of Geneo, The Kingdom of Naples and several other countries. Their objective was to stop the invasion of Europe by the Muslim forces of the Ottoman Empire.

The Holy League set out with over 200 naval ships to encounter the Ottoman forces. On the eve before the battle off the coast of Greece, Pope Pius V decreed that every soldier of the Holy League was to carry a rosary, and they were to pray the rosary the night before the battle asking the intercession of our Lady to intercede on their behalf and help secure a victory. Far away in Rome, Pope Pius V spent the day in prayer, praying the rosary.

On October 7, 1571, the forces of the Holy League and the Ottoman Empire met off the coast of Greece in the battle of Lepanto. In a fierce battle that lasted almost the entire day, the Holy League defeated the forces of the Ottoman Empire and virtually destroyed their naval forces.

When Pope Pius V heard of the victory—and the defeat of the Muslim plans to invade and conquer Europe, he attributed the victory to Our Lady through the prayers of Christians throughout Europe. He established a feast in honor of Our Lady of Victory to be celebrated each

The lower half of the painting shows the events of the battle of Lepanto, while at the top a female personification of Venice is presented to the Virgin Mary, with Saint Roch, Saint Peter, Saint Justina, Saint Mark and a group of angels in attendance.

October 7th, in thanksgiving for our Lady's intercession. The name of the feast was eventually changed to the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, and has come to be an annual reminder of the power of prayer and the intercessory place our Lady has in the life of the Church.

The forces of the Holy League were disbanded a few years after the Battle of Lepanto. Pope Saint Pius V died about eight months after the Battle of Lepanto and is regarded as one of the most influential popes in the history of the Church.

May the Lord continue to bless all our efforts offered in His name, and may His Mother, Mary Immaculate, Patroness of our nation, watch over us and intercede for us!

Court Washington #1651

The City Mission in Washington PA, which provides hot meals, warm showers, a safe bed and a smile to the homeless, suffered severe fire damage to their main building on June 9. The mission houses 65 men and provides three hot meals each day to approximately 100-120 homeless men, women and children.

In addition to a monetary donation, we contacted the mission to determine how we could help with the meals that were desperately needed, since their kitchen facilities were destroyed in the fire. We offered to provide lunch the day after our July meeting and asked that the members bring one dozen sandwich buns and one dozen cookies to the meeting. They responded with approximately 40 dozen buns and 50 dozen

cookies! Several members also donated cash that covered most of the cost of the meats, cheeses, lettuce and tomatoes, mayonnaise and mustard. In addition, we enlisted the families of the children who attended Vacation Bible School the previous week to donate single-serve items such as fruit cups, pudding cups, chips, sandwich crackers and cereal bars—and they responded with approximately 500 single-serving items!

On July 8th, 14 of our members and the 8-year-old daughter of one member arrived at 9 a.m. in the church hall to prepare the trays. Our Chaplain, Father William Feeney, blessed the food before we delivered it to the mission's Bible Chapel which was set up as a dining hall.

Since prepared meals are the mission's top need (in addition to monetary donations) as they continue operations, our members voted to continue providing one meal a month until they are able to resume normal operations, which may take several months. We will provide lunch in August and dinner in September and will schedule future monthly meals based on the needs of the mission.

JCDA / YOUTH

To date we have no JCDA Courts in Pennsylvania, though there is still interest in a couple of areas. National currently directs all inquiries concerning establishing a JCDA Court for anyone interested. This would be a great way to nurture personal and spir-

itual growth, to promote service to others and to foster an awareness and appreciation of diversity in our youth.

For our courts with a strong youth group in the parish (which seems to lessen the chance to form a JCDA), Court members could find ways to help. The best way may be to volunteer to become a leader. This is, however, a time consuming—yet very rewarding—activity. You could also ask the current leaders what their projects are and ask if the court could help—physically, monetarily or spiritually. Let the youth of your parish know that the CDA exists, what our goals are, and perhaps encourage them to join in the future.

With school starting, there are many opportunities to help the youth. You do not have to have a Catholic school nearby. Through your church office, the youth group, St. Vincent de Paul, Salvation Army, an abused victims' home or an orphanage, or any other group that would know the needs of children, learn if there are needs that your court can meet. There may be a need for new school clothes, back packs and other school supplies or assistance with meal programs. If there is a Catholic school near you, they may need help with tuition.

Faith Formation classes are beginning. Once again, you may have members volunteer to teach the classes. In addi-

The Nativity of Mary

ary's is a birthday [commemorated September 8] to remember because the answer to our sorrow, misery, malice, loneliness, inability, and strife is to be born of Mary. When Mary is born, says Saint Andrew of Crete († 740), "we are led toward the truth, and we are led away from our condition of slavery... How can this be? Darkness yields before the coming of the light."

Saint John Vianney extols Mary: "Your birth, O Blessed Virgin Mary, fills the whole world with a sweet consolation and a holy joy, because of you was born our Jesus, our God, who has taken away from us the curse in which we were plunged by the sin of our first parents, and filled us with all kinds of blessings." And that is why we are eager to know, and to return in the liturgy, to the moment of Mary's birth: so that we can participate totally in the mystery whereby the possibility of our happiness and salvation is born of a woman.

We commemorate then "the birth of the Virgin, with whom is likewise born our salvation."
