A silent man alone



Wilderness Retreat



Before any important event in the life of Jesus, He went into a wilderness place to pray for guidance from His Father. Inspired by this, the members of Court Reverend Patrick McArdle #448 developed their "Wilderness Retreat."

The day began with group prayer. Each participant was asked to define their "wilderness" concern and to write it on a piece of paper. Then, based on the verse: "ABBA FATHER—YOU are the potter, we are the clay," they were given some clay to fashion their own "pot," which would slowly harden throughout the day. Having been given a burlap bag at the beginning of the retreat, both

the pot and the wilderness concern were placed in the bag. Then they began to rotate through three stations for 15 minutes each.

STATION 1 – Assorted prayer cards were provided, along with blank paper, so each could choose a card or write their own prayer. They reflected on this prayer while listening to spiritual music. The prayer was placed into the pouch.

STATION 2 – Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament was already established in the church, along with three different blessed pendants: "LET GO—LET GOD"; PRAY, FAST, GIVE"; or SERENITY, COURAGE, WISDOM." After choosing one of the three, participants reflected on their pendant as they meditated before the Blessed Sacrament while listening to spiritual music. They either wore the pendant or placed it into the pouch.

STATION 3 – Stations of the Cross—Each chose to sit quietly before one Station of their choosing and reflected quietly on just what that station meant in their own "wilderness" concern and how the station kept them humble. They could try to relate to one person in the Station or try to place themselves at that place and time and reflect on what their thoughts may have been.

The Retreat ended with the entire group assembling in the auditorium to share a variety of breads and water as was fitting for a "wilderness experience." The day ended with prayer and all exited the auditorium in silence, all better equipped to meet the challenge of their own "wilderness experience." This Retreat was held on March 7, 2020. What a wonderful way to prepare for what the next year had in store for the world. ◆

2021 Circle of Love Education Report

I would like to say kudos to all my CDA sisters that attempted or succeeded in carrying out Education Projects and/or the Education Contest. It has been a very challenging time and just making an effort to rise above the tidal wave of craziness that has been this year deserves a pat on the back.

There were 23 Circle of Love reports turned in this year and of those only three had nothing to report. Courts focused on their adult members participating in the Education Contest and in the process brought joy to members stuck in assisted living housing. One court used meetings to educate members about the social teachings of the church while another used meetings to instruct its members about the Circle of Love Spokes with the hope of sparking new ideas and perhaps new officers.



There was a court that took the lead from their local Catholic Charities and prepared backpacks with school supplies to help low-income students with virtual learning. Most of these kids only have access to these supplies in school. Some courts had members who volunteered and even took leadership positions in their parish Faith Formation programs while some helped pay for supplies for the Faith Formation programs. There were some courts that focused on financially assisting students to attend Catholic elementary and high schools. All of the reports were encouraging and amazing especially because they were accomplished in spite of this difficult year.

The State level of the National Education Contest received entries from 17 local courts. Understandably, there were fewer entries this year, but some of the entries were amazing. There were some entries that looked very familiar—which was disappointing. I did receive an entry from a local education chair that did not follow the rule to not fold or roll entries. I'd like to remind the local chairs that what you do can affect the overall score of an entry. I think the slower pace this year helped the students put more time, effort and thought into their work. •

What we give is what we get...

Dear Catholic Daughters of the Americas and Friends,



Throughout it we have heard a number of stories that told us how the early Church transformed or translated the meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection into their daily lives. We know that many of the early followers encountered resurrected Jesus. Some, of course, on Sunday, the first day of the week and some on the following days. During this time, they experienced many feelings such as fears and doubts but also joy and

hope. What we can find inspiring is that the world around them got to see that they truly believed that their Master and Savior was risen from the dead, that it was not just a dream or their imagination. The world saw it by the way they conducted their lives on a day-to-day basis and because they did, their numbers kept increasing.

One of the words we heard frequently as we listen to the post-Resurrection stories is witnesses. That is who Jesus' followers became. We know how important witnesses are in a court of law. They can powerfully impact the outcome of the trial. Jesus's disciples understood and were aware of what they had to offer. The world around them, just like we sometimes see today, was cruel, unjust, violent and dark. But seeing the reality of it all, they didn't say: Look what the world has come to, but look what has come into the world; Christians, i.e., Christ people.

Today, we may feel discouragement and be disappointed at what we see in the world around us. We can become sarcastic or pessimistic. We may have questions, such as: Jesus, if you're really the Son of God, why aren't you doing more? Why isn't your Church attracting more people, especially

young? Where's the glory you promised, Lord? Why are there still wars and poverty and injustice? Why aren't we more effective in proclaiming your message? What are we as Jesus' disciples to do? And Jesus responds with his life-giving words: Love me. Keep my word. My Holy Spirit is with you, strengthening, protecting and guiding you.

We can't imagine the early followers of Jesus doing any of the work of continuing His mission without the guidance of the Holy Spirit. He made them strong and courageous with his manifold gifts. He transformed them into resurrected people, Easter people, that brought the new life that Jesus promised into the world, whether it was convenient or inconvenient. This is the gift the Church and all its members must offer now and always. How?

I once heard a story of a little boy who, in an outburst of anger, shouted to his mother: "I hate you! I hate you! I hate you!" Then, fearing punishment, he ran up into the hillside where he shouted into the valley: "I hate you! I hate you! I hate you!" And back from the valley came the echo: "I hate you! I hate you! I hate you!" This terrified
